# Kindergarten, Here We Come! Poudre School District's Guide

to Entering Kindergarten



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#### Dear Early Childhood Parent,

It is time for kindergarten!! Your child will be transitioning from his/her preschool experience and into elementary school. This is an exciting time, but one filled with many questions and new learning opportunities for both you and your child. The Early Childhood Program has many staff, such as teachers, family mentors, program specialists, and administrators, who are prepared to support your family during this new experience in your child's life.

As educators and parents, we know that a smooth transition to kindergarten is an essential part of your child's academic experience. There are three keys to a successful transition to kindergarten, they are:

- 1. Building a collaborative relationship with the elementary school, kindergarten teachers, and school principals.
- 2. "Knowledge is Power": Parents need to be knowledgeable of the process, timeline and paperwork needed in January and February 2011.
- 3. Communication of next steps that need to be taken with your child to build academic, social and emotional awareness as they approach the transition into kindergarten, August 2011.



The Early Childhood Transition Committee has

developed this new "Kindergarten Transition" handbook that will support you during the transition process to ensure you have all the tools for both you and your child to be successful in kindergarten. The steps in the book are important for each parent (guardian) to follow to learn more about kindergarten and how to register your child.

While this time can be very exciting, it can be overwhelming as well. I encourage you to attend the Kindergarten Informational Meetings around the District in January, and gain as much information as you can in order to choose the right school for your child. If you have questions please feel free to contact your child's teacher, family mentor or myself for additional support.

## **Going to Kindergarten**

#### It's hard to believe that it is time to start planning for kindergarten, but it is!

There will be changes as your child leaves their preschool program and enters elementary school. This can be a time of both excitement and concern for both you and your child.

Preparing children for change is important, so they can be successful in their next environment.

### Important kindergarten skills include:

Social skills ... taking turns, greeting friends, sharing toys and materials

Behavioral skills... sitting quietly for a story, raising hand to talk

Work skills ... holding a pencil, coloring independently, writing their name

Communication skills ... asking for help, expressing feelings

Self-management skills ... going to the bathroom, getting a drink, zipping coat

These skills are not required before entering kindergarten, but children who practice these skills are more successful when moving into kindergarten. Building relationships is another way to help ease the change into kindergarten. A relationship with the school staff and teachers will help you and your child feel more comfortable. A relationship with other children at the school creates friendships.

# Transition is the PROCESS of changing from one place to another.

#### What We Know About Transition and Changes

- Transition is a lifelong process.
- Good transitions require planning.
- Good transitions require trust.
- Good transitions require communication.
- Good transitions encourage and support children.



## Is Your Child Ready for School?

In connection with the Colorado Department of Education's definition of school readiness, Poudre School District has defined four areas of school readiness for children entering kindergarten:

Language and Literacy Development

Social and Emotional Development

Physical Well-Being

Family Support and Parent Education

Being ready for school comes from the variety of experiences prior to kindergarten. A high-quality early childhood education, whether provided by family or a formal program, increases a child's ability to succeed in school.





# Children are ready for a successful transition to school when:

- Any possible health concerns have been detected and addressed.
- A child's enthusiasm, curiosity and persistence toward learning is encouraged.
- A child is effective at communicating emotions such as frustrations, anger, joy and general needs.
- A child is able to get along well with others, both in playing and everyday activities.
- A child can demonstrate early reading skills.
- A child has general knowledge about the world, things, places, events and people.

Each child grows at their own rate. By reinforcing the skills listed above every child can be successful in kindergarten.

# What do I need to bring to kindergarten registration? Bring your child's:

- Birth certificate (original or certified copy preferred)
- **\*** Emergency contact information
- **\*** Immunization records

## What immunizations are required for kindergarten enrollment?

Vaccine	Shots	Notes
DTP/DTaP/ DT/Td	5	may enter with 4 doses if #4 was given at/after age 4. ("P" pertussis is not required when age 7 - 9)
Polio	4	may enter with 3 doses if #3 was given at/after age 4
MMR	2	
Hepatitis B	3	
Varicella/ Chickenpox	2	2 doses at least 28 days apart (prefer 3 mo. apart) - or history of disease by health provider, or lab test

## What schools offer a full-day program?

All schools in PSD offer full-day programs.

### What schools offer half-day programs?

All schools offer half-day programs EXCEPT Harris, Irish, Lab School, Laurel and Putnam.

## Is there a cost for full-day and what is that amount?

Yes, there is usually a cost for full-day kindergarten. Please contact the school your child will attend for more information. There may be scholarships available.

### What is the age requirement for kindergarten?

Children must be 5 years old on or before September 15 of the year they will attend school.

### How do I know which school is my neighborhood school?

Visit http://eweb.psdschools.org/ schools/schoollocator.aspx or call 490-3232.

### Where do I register my child for school?

Register your child at their neighborhood school. If you're choosing to go through the School Choice process, you still must register your child at their neighborhood school.

### How will my child get to kindergarten?

District transportation is provided for elementary students who live one mile or more away from school. Half-day students are only provided transportation one way, (to school for morning kindergarten and from school for afternoon kindergarten). Round-trip transportation is the responsibility of the parents for School Choice students.

### Going to Kindergarten FAQ continued

#### What is School Choice?

Whether you're choosing a neighborhood school outside your boundary area or specialized school, PSD's School Choice program allows you to select the school that best fits your child's educational needs, on a space available basis. Round-trip transportation is the responsibility of the parents for School Choice students. To find out more about School Choice visit the PSD website. (http://www. psdschools.org/academics/educationalchoices)

### Does my child have to attend kindergarten?

Kindergarten attendance is optional in the State of Colorado.

### At what age does a child have to attend school?

A child does not have to attend school until his/her sixth birthday.

### How can I prepare my child for kindergarten?

By reading this handbook, you are already preparing your child for kindergarten. Some other ways you can help your child prepare for kindergarten are:

- Help them practice writing their name
- Practice recognizing numbers, shapes, and colors
- Practice recognizing the letters of the alphabet
- Prepare your child to be independent and take care of their own needs (bathroom, drinks, food, etc.)
- **\*** Read to your child every day!
- Provide access to a wide variety of books, either at home or through the public library



## **School Registration**

- 1. Use the School Locator on the PSD website, www.psdschools.org, to determine which school serves your neighborhood.
- 2. Gather immunization records (or a signed exemption statement of religious or personal objection), and emergency contact information. In addition, a birth certificate is required for new kindergartners.
- 3. Call the school; they will walk you through the registration process.

Families who do not have computer access can visit any PSD school or the district office, 2407 LaPorte Avenue, Fort Collins, to apply.

#### **Kindergarten**

- Children must be 5 years old on or before September 15.
- Attend an information night at the school(s) of your choice to learn about their program and meet their teachers.
- Kindergarten registration begins the second Thursday in February.

Check the PSD website, www. psdschools.org, for the schedule and registration information.

#### **School Choice**

School Choice Applications are based on space availability for enrollment in kindergarten – 12th grade. Round-trip transportation is the responsibility of the parents for School Choice students.

#### **School Choice Application**

Visit the School Registration page of the PSD website, www.psdschools.org, and review the following:

- School Choice Timeline (Elementary and Secondary)
- School Choice Policy

Access the online application via the district website at www.psdschools.org under the School Registration link.

#### Rules to Remember

Applications are not considered on a first-come, first-served basis; they are considered based on space available. If your child is entering kindergarten, you need to register your child with your neighborhood school in February in addition to completing a School Choice Application.

Once a student is accepted into school of choice, they are eligible to attend through all grades offered.

Choosing a school is similar to choosing a new car or a home. Please see Parent Pages for helpful worksheets on choosing and visiting schools.

Thank you for registering your child. Congratulations on completing this important step in your child's educational process!


#### After you have registered:

- Save a copy of the registration forms you submitted. Keeping them in the pockets of this notebook is a great way to stay organized.
- Keep this notebook handy throughout the year for:
  - 🔆 tips for learning at home
  - \* to help keep track of important school papers

- If you've filled out a School Choice Application,
  - \* watch for your child's school assignment notice
  - call the school for a timeline of notification
- Get ready to start school! The staff at your child's school will contact you with more information about open houses and other opportunities to welcome new families to the school community.

## Learning at Home

#### Families are so busy - it's hard to find extra time, but little changes add up.

#### Children Begin Learning at Home You count! You and your family are the first people in a child's life to:

- \* appreciate who they are and what they do
- ✤ to encourage curiosity
- \* communicate family values
- establish a strong foundation for learning that lasts a lifetime

### Young children are more likely to thrive in school when...

- ✤ they know lots of words
- \* are able to express their ideas and needs

### Spending time talking and playing with your child helps...

- ✤ increase their vocabulary
- makes them feel good about themselves
- helps them begin school eager and ready to learn

#### Play to Help Your Child Learn

These activities have no-cost, no calories and require no batteries!

Just 20 minutes a day makes a big difference.

### TALK

Talk often to your child!

Listen carefully to what he/she says. **Tell** stories and jokes.

#### Activity: "Once Upon a Time"

- 🔆 Tell a story about yourself.
- 🗧 Tell about your grandparents.
- When your child hears you talk they learn new words.
- 🔆 Your stories help them love stories!
- **\*\*** Ask him/her to tell you a story.

### PLAY

Let your child have plenty of playtime.

Playing encourages the use of imagination, practicing language and having fun.

When you play with your child, it's a great time for the whole family to share words and ideas.

#### **GO PLACES**

When you go places, there are lots of new things to talk about.

### Remember what is routine for you is probably new to your child.

#### Activity: Driving in the Car

- Turn off the radio and have a conversation with your child.
- Describe what you see out the window.
- Sing songs.
- Ask questions about what your child can see.
- ⊱ Be sure to listen.

### Learning at Home continued

#### Activity: Let's Pretend

- 🔆 Play pretend with your child.
- 🐥 Act out events that interest them.
- Pretend to have a birthday party, go to a restaurant, fly in a plane, go swimming or sledding.
- 🔆 Remember, it is just pretend.

#### DRAW OR "WRITE"

Drawing and scribbling are the beginning stages of writing. This helps develop fine motor skills and their imagination.

- Have your child "write" their own shopping list, even if it is just scribbles. Use anything you have, plain or recycled paper and crayons or washable markers.
- \* Make pictures and pretend to write.

#### Activity: "I Spy"

You can play this anywhere, while shopping, driving or reading the newspaper.

- Pick a letter from your child's name and see if you can find it.
- Pick a color and see if they can find an object in that same color.
- Pick a number and have your child find that many items.

#### READ

The more books your child reads, the more successful they'll be in school. Set the example for lifelong reading.

- Books don't have to be new to be great.
- Ask relatives and friends to give books as presents.
- Pick up books at a yard sale.
- ✤ Go to the library.
- \* Talk about the pictures in the books.
- Show children how to use books by showing them how to turn pages gently and handle them with care.

Make a commitment to read to your child every day! Anytime of the day works. It WILL be the most important 20 minutes in your day.

#### Activity: "My Favorite Part"

After reading a book, talk with your child about each of your favorite parts of the story. Ask them about their favorite part.

## Moving On & Saying Goodbye

Some suggested activities for helping your child say "goodbye" to their Preschool or Early Child Care Center include:

#### Make a goodbye book or chart.

- Include photos or drawings of their favorite parts of preschool.
- Include a page that has pictures or drawings of what kindergarten will be like.

### Try a "count down" calendar to the start of kindergarten.

- Make a paper chain representing the days until school begins. Taking off a link each day can make the passage of time real to your child.
- Use a regular calendar and mark off each day.

### Consider any logistical changes the transition will create.

Will your child need to leave earlier or later in the morning? Will there be a bus? Will your drive or walk to school? How will kindergarten change your family's existing schedules?

#### Practice new routines.

- 🔆 Get up earlier.
- Drive, walk, or ride that new route to school.
- Look out for new landmarks to point out to your child.

#### Learn as much as you can about the school and the kindergarten classroom before your child begins.

- ✤ Talk with the staff.
- Ask for information from the teachers.
- Ask for and read the school's parent handbook.
- Get to know the parents of other children in the school. Visit the classroom and the school with your child.

# Once your child begins, get involved in the school and classroom.

- Ask about family involvement opportunities the school offers.
- Xolunteer in the classroom.
- \* Attend workshops or family nights.
- ✤ Join the parent association.

Remember, you are looking for a school that will make the educational experience for your child and you as rewarding as possible.

## Choosing a school is much like buying a new house or car.

If you were looking to buy a car, vacuum cleaner, or refrigerator, you could talk to friends and family and find information on the Internet, in consumer magazines, or in other published resources.

Similarly, when choosing a school, you may also have to make phone calls and collect written material from different schools to get the information you need. Start your search by thinking about your child. After all, you know your son or daughter better than anyone else does.


### **Map of Schools**

#### Mountain Schools (From Fort Collins)

Livermore: Take US-287 N to Laramie, WY (Laporte Bypass); go 16.5 miles to Livermore. Turn left on Red Feather Lakes Road (CR 74E); school is on the right.

Red Feather: Take US-287 N to Laramie, WY (Laporte Bypass); go 16.5 miles to Livermore. Turn left on Red Feather Lakes Road (CR 74E); continue 24 miles; turn slight right onto CR 73C (Creedmore Lakes Road); go .5 miles to school site.

Stove Prairie: Take US-287 N, stay straight to go onto CR-54G/Old US 287. Turn left on CR-52E/Rist Canyon Road. Go 13.2 miles to school site.





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
