Transportation

Greetings! This issue of the newsletter should be Titled: *"Planes, Trains, and Automobiles!*

Transportation is frequently one of the barriers to employment and access to recreational activities for many of our students once they leave school. This issue of the Transition Newsletter will focus on some of the varied forms of transportation available in and around the Fort Collins area. Some of our students in transition are learning safety in the community and how to use public transportation safely is a critical life skill!

Accessible transportation options in and around Fort Collins are growing, as a result of public comment and advocacy. Thanks to expansion services a student from Fort Collins can take a bus to Loveland to work. Trans Fort offers travel training and reduced-price bus passes for individuals with a disability.

What will transportation options for a young adult look like after exiting the public school system? This is a key transition question and may result in the need to seek out a variety of options – including the MAX, Dial a Ride and consideration of services like Uber, SAINT and zRide.

Next time you are out and about in Old Town – check out our highlighted business Starry Night Coffee House. And hey! You can get there by using the MAX!

Spring is right around the corner – so go explore and maybe walk or check out a bike!

How to Find and Use Accessible Transportation in Your Community

For many people with limited mobility, planning travel can be frustrating... especially when transportation is not accessible or available. To spread the word about accessible transportation in all communities, Easterseals Project Action Consulting – a training and technical assistance center – shares the following tips and potential solutions:

How do I find a ride?

First, think through your needs and what you want to accomplish.

- Are you traveling with family or a friend, a personal assistant, caregiver, or with a service animal? The number of travelers may affect which form of transportation you might take.
- When and where are you traveling?
- Where are you going?
- Then, explore the various types of transportation available in your community, and consider calling the 2-1-1 service to receive information about the transportation available in your location.



Some options may include:

- Fixed Route: Buses and rail systems that run on a predetermined route on a fixed schedule;
- Taxis: Some taxis are accessible and may provide paratransit trips;
- ADA Complementary Paratransit Service: This is for people who, due to disability, cannot use public transportation like buses and rail systems. This service complements the fixed route in hours of operation and service area;
- Flex Route: Flex routes operate on a fixed route, with published bus routes, but will deviate from that route a small distance to provide door-to-door service to those that need additional assistance;
- Human Service Transportation: An array of transportation service options for people with disabilities and older adults that vary based on their communities. These services could range from mileage reimbursement, to individual transportation requests.

What skills are needed to use public transportation?

To use a fixed route service, passengers should be able to, within a reasonable level of effort:

- Get and remember transit system information;
- Travel to the transit stop or station;
- Enter and exit transit stations;
- Locate and recognize which bus or train to take;
- Recognize destination

What is ADA Complementary Paratransit and am I eligible? The ADA Complementary Paratransit service is available for people with disabilities who are unable to use fixed-route transportation. Those eligible for the service fall into one of three categories:

- People with disabilities that are unable to use a fixed route service;
- People with disabilities that have the ability to use accessible fixed route services but the service available is inaccessible;
- People with disabilities that are unable to travel to or from a station or a bus stop

In order to use the ADA Complementary Paratransit service, you may have to go through an eligibility process, which can include a paper or electronic application, confirmation of disability, interview, functional physical assessment, functional cognitive assessment, and path of travel assessment.

The Arc of Larimer County firmly believes that individuals with disabilities should have full access to their community. Adequate transportation is a key piece to living and working in a community, which is why in 2015 we started working with The City of Fort Collins and aligned organizations to make sure that bus stops are brought up to comply with standards set by the American with Disabilities Act (ADA). At the time, about 35% of bus stops in Fort Collins were in compliance with the ADA. The City responded to the request and allocated additional funds to speed up the process. In 2017, they upgraded 43 bus stops meaning today about 60% of bus stops in Fort Collins are fully accessible to people with disabilities.

Ride with Us

Seventy-five percent of our clients say SAINT is very important to their independence.



SAINT serves people sixty years old and older and people eighteen to sixty years old who have disabilities that prevent them from driving in Fort Collins, Colorado and Loveland, Colorado. SAINT cannot provide transportation to individuals requiring wheelchairs or scooters.

SAINT operates sister programs in Fort Collins and Loveland. SAINT cannot provide transportation between the two cities. SAINT provides transportation to any destination within our service areas for any purpose. Please contact a SAINT scheduler at the numbers listed below to determine whether your address is within one of our service areas. While many of our rides are to medical providers, we also take clients to the grocery store, the hairdresser, the Senior Center, and places of employment or volunteer service, to name a few destinations. There is no charge for SAINT's services, but donations are appreciated.

SAINT operates from 8:15 am to 4 pm Monday through Friday.

SAINT is a pre-scheduled service. Riders must call to make reservations at least three business days in advance of the requested date. The further in advance a rider can call to schedule a ride, the more likely we are to have the requested date and time available. Rides can be scheduled for the current month and the following month. Rides are scheduled on a first come, first served basis.

Schedulers are available to take reservations Monday through Friday from 8 am to noon. To determine your eligibility and enroll in the SAINT program and to schedule rides please call:

Biking

Biking is a great way to get to know <u>Fort Collins</u>. With relatively flat terrain, wide bike lanes, and trails that follow the <u>Poudre River</u> and Spring Creek, biking is a fun, healthy, and environmentally friendly way to recreate. Whether you're exploring Fort Collins' 285-plus miles of trails or biking in the mountains, climbing and ascending through the awe-inspiring landscape, you'll understand why Fort Collins has been named a platinum level bike-friendly city. One trip to <u>Downtown</u> and you'll see more bikes than cars on the road. Head five miles west to <u>Lory State Park</u> or <u>Horsetooth</u> Mountain Open Space to find mountain biking trails for all skill levels. Visit the <u>City of Fort Collins Natural Areas</u> for information on riding the foothills trails.

Fort Collins offers a Bike Share program called Pace which is a public transportation program that includes a network of bicycles for short-term use. The Bike Share program is a collaboration of Bike Fort Collins, FC Bikes, Zagster, Transfort, and a number of local business sponsors. A variety of self-guided tours is offered, from the "Bike the Sites" collection, including the Brewery Tour, Environmental Learning Tour, and the Historic Homes Tour. All about Pace - the Fort Collins Bike Share Program

1. The Fort Collins Bike Share has gotten a facelift.

 The City of Fort Collins and Bike Fort Collins, the same team behind the former Fort Collins Bike Library, have partnered with Zagster to launch <u>Pace</u>. Pace Fort Collins is a product of Zagster, and is a modern, dockless bike share system that allows riders to dock their bikes at any local bike rack at the end a ride. Fort Collins residents and guests may now check out a bike on-demand, 24/7, using their phone.

2. How do I use Pace Fort Collins?

Download the free Pace app from the App Store or Google Play

- Create a profile (name and email)
- Enter in credit card information, promo codes, EBT membership or cash payment option
- Find a bike at a station or local bike rack using the real time map in the app
- Unlock your bike using the app and start pedaling

Youth Ride Free – anyone age 17 and under ride Transfort routes for free, including MAX and FLEX. Students need to show a valid school I.D. or can get a free Youth Pass at a transit center. Requirements for getting a Youth Pass can be found here:

http://ridetransfort.com/fares-passes/fares-passes If a student is still enrolled in school but has already turned 18, they can still ride for free with their school I.D.

Dial-a-Ride is a door to door paratransit service for individuals who, because of a disability, are prevented from using Transfort's fixed route system. There is an application process in order to be eligible for this service. Bus Passes for Individuals with Disabilities are good for one year from the date of purchase and cost \$25.00. An application is attached. The application should be filled out by the applicant and the medical professional and then faxed or emailed to Transfort Customer Service. Free Travel Training is available for small groups or individuals. Travel Training includes how to read the bus schedules, how to plan a trip, paying a fare, transfers, operating hours and more! Training typically starts at a transit center and includes riding different routes. An ongoing monthly training on MAX occurs every 2nd Tuesday of the month at 10am. Other trainings can be scheduled outside of this time by contacting customer service.

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People With Disabilities Are Entitled to a Free Lifetime Pass to National Parks

If you or your child has a permanent disability you may be entitled to a free, lifetime pass to visit the National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands.

I actually learned about the program because a friend of mine's child has Type-1 diabetes and qualifies for the program. Qualifying disabilities include physical, mental, or sensory impairments.



The pass can be used at over 2000 Federal recreation sites across the nation. Those include National Parks, National Wildlife Refuges, National Forests, and other federal recreation lands. It also extends that same privilege to everyone in the vehicle with the pass holder. So, if one person in your family qualifies, you can all visit a park for free with that person's pass.

In order to get a pass you'll need:

- A statement signed by a licensed physician attesting that you have a permanent physical, mental, or sensory impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, and stating the nature of the impairment; OR
- A document issued by a Federal agency, such as the U.S. Department of Veterans Administration, which attests that you have been medically determined to be eligible to receive Federal benefits as a result of blindness or permanent disability. Other acceptable Federal agency documents include proof of receipt of Social Security Disability Income (SSDI) or Supplemental Security Income (SSI); OR
- A document issued by a State agency such as a vocational rehabilitation agency, which attests that you have been medically determined to be eligible to receive vocational rehabilitation agency benefits or services as a result of medically determined blindness or permanent disability. Showing a State motor vehicle department disability sticker, license plate or hang tag is not acceptable documentation.

You'll need to <u>fill out this application</u>, and then either mail it in with a \$10 processing fee or go to a federal recreation site in person with proof of disability and residency, in which case you can skip paying the fee and filling out the form. The Access Passes can also be purchased online through <u>store.usgs.gov/access-pass</u>, which is the organization's preferred way to receive applications. Once your application is processed, you'll receive a physical card that can be used for park admission.



Positive Youth Development

This year, the Rocky Mountain High School Integrated Services(IS) team is implementing a new, multifaceted social skills program called Positive Youth Development (PYD). This class targets students who benefit from direct instruction around perspective-taking, interpersonal skills, social competence, problem-solving, emotional regulation, and crisis management. Students involved in the program start each day with instruction from a collaborative team that includes an Integrated Services teacher, Shannon Kummer; a school social worker, Tricia Van Horssen; and two school psychologists, Melanie Potyondy and Brad Reimers, who each contribute to activities that approach student needs through different modalities. Daily, students have a chance to strengthen their social-emotional skills

through such activities as art therapy, service learning through the Give Next program, wellness activities, team building, or participation in a modified Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) curriculum for teens. This new initiative allows a diverse group of students to start their school day in a safe, relationship-oriented setting, encouraging better attendance, connection, and classroom engagement as they move into their traditional high school programming. PYD fulfills a need that the Rocky IS team identified with regard to providing individualized intervention to students with affective and behavioral barriers, so that all Lobos can reach their full potential in the classroom, in their relationships, and in our community.



Larimer County Conservation Corps

Our Mission

The Larimer County Conservation Corps (LCCC) promotes individual development through service for the benefit of our environment and community. LCCC is housed within and administered by the Larimer County Economic and Workforce Development.



In 1986 the Larimer County Economic and Workforce Development created a summer youth employment program called Operation Brightside with support from the local Anheuser-Busch brewery. Within this program youth participants made repairs and home improvements for elderly and disabled residents of Larimer County, Colorado.

In 1993, Operation Brightside was re-conceived as the Larimer County Conservation Corps (LCCC) to address two key issues: the persistent challenges youth and young adults face in securing employment and gaining work experience; and to maintain local parks, open spaces, and natural lands for the enjoyment of the community.

Through conservation projects and environmental education, we empower our corps members to become environmental stewards, while developing self-sufficiency and work preparation skills to help them become productive members of our community. The LCCC is an accredited corps through the Colorado Youth Corps Association and is based in Fort Collins, Colorado.

To date, the LCCC operates seasonal programs focusing on a variety of conservation projects such as trail building/maintenance, habitat restoration, fire mitigation, invasive species removal, and home efficiency.

Each of our programs is unique within the corps, but each one reflects our core values of environmental conservation and individual development. The majority of work done by LCCC crews is supported through fee-for-service contract dollars and grant funding.

Our Goals

- * To promote self-sufficiency in youth and young adults through skill development for personal and professional growth.
- * To increase participant's knowledge and awareness of community and environmental issues through education and service learning.
- * To complete meaningful and long lasting conservation projects in Northern Colorado that benefits our environment and community.
